

## \* Dancing in Greece \*

❖ Cassandra Hall reports that she had the time of her life in Greece, at Kyriakos Moisidis's Dancing Seminar! She writes: "We spent the first part of the seminar on a small island off the coast of Halkidiki, and it was nothing short of paradise. We attended the annual festival every evening we were there, and watched as they performed demo dances in their traditional costumes. The second half of the seminar was spent mostly near the city of Thessaloniki and in the small villages on the outskirts of Thessaloniki and Perea. The villagers were all very warm and welcoming, and very appreciative of our interest in their music and culture.

"It was wonderful seeing Kyriakos again and meeting a marvelous group of fellow dancers from all over the world. Many dancers were from Germany and Israel, a handful from the Czech Republic and Austria, one from Russia, a few from the UK, one from New Zealand, and three (apart from myself) from the States. The dances we learned were all fantastic, and if given the opportunity I would be delighted to share a few of them with MVFD. Most are quite easy with lovely music. One or two are a bit more difficult, but the majority of our dancers should have no problem learning them."
